Papakura is heading into a busy time as the weather improves and a range of fun family, cultural and community events are planned.

### **Papakura means business**

For the businesses of the district, Papakura's popular programme of Business Breakfasts offer a valuable chance to network and to hear inspirational speakers including Fonterra CEO Andrew Ferrier in September and Peter Douglas, chairman of *Te Ohu Kaimoana*, the Waitangi Fisheries Commission in October.

The first year of the new Stevenson Business Excellence Programme is about developing business capability through a series of workshops and an optional free business health check, with the second year focussing on entries into the Stevenson Business Excellence Awards. ▶ appeal, which benefits children's wards at hospitals around Auckland and nationwide. Last year, the appeal raised more than \$1 million for five hospitals; this year the aim is to double the total and provide support for ten hospitals.

The district gets its "race face" on in October when the annual Papakura Blue Light Trolley Derby rolls out onto Elliott Street with classes for children of all ages.

An exciting family fun event, the Trolley Derby is already inspiring families to design and build their own trolleys. For those who need some technical assistance, there are trolley-building workshops at Mitre 10 Mega in Takanini on September 20 and 21 from 12.00 noon to 3.00 pm.

Entry in any category costs just \$10, and among the categories there's even a Schools Cup for trolleys made and entered by schools in the district and driven by a student of the school. These trolleys will be auctioned at the prizegiving. The Trolley Derby will be held on Sunday 19 October with registration and sign-in between 7.30 and 8.30 am and racing at 9.00 am.

On Saturday September 27, the Papakura Spring Carnival fills the town square with colour and sound – and some delicious cakes as well! The Carnival will feature children's rides, entertainment, a petting zoo with farm animals and spot prizes and runs from 9.00 am till 2.00 pm.

Home composting is a great way to make use of kitchen scraps and it creates the very best fertiliser for your garden. As people start to look for ways to reduce the cost of living, vegetable gardens are making a comeback.

comprehensive information about making compost either in a bin or a compost heap; along with the more advanced worm farms and the Bokashi technique - which even copes with meat and fish waste.

## Woolly Nightshade is for the chop

It's a pest plant also known as Tobacco

Weed, Flannel Leaf or Kerosene Plant. It's broad leaved with soft felt-like leaves drab green/grey on top and white to creamy grey underneath, clusters of purple flowers and berries that can turn yellow when ripe. Flowers, leaves, berries and seeds are highly toxic to humans, particularly children. The leaf and tree sap will irritate and sting skin.

Papakura is declaring war on Woolly Nightshade, removing it from public reserves and asking land owners to do their part.

Official classification as a pest plant means there is a legal requirement for land-owners to remove all woolly nightshade within 20m of their boundary once a complaint is received.

## Papakura Normal School wades in



Up against Wai Care groups from Rodney District, North Shore, Waitakere City, Auckland

City and Manukau City, a group of dedicated teachers and children from Papakura Normal School have won the Wai Care "Encourage and Inspire" award.

The group devised an entire learning unit focussing on water quality issues called "Precious Water" that involved children from all years at the school.

Papakura Wai Care co-ordinator Laura Torre says Wai Care involvement has significantly increased this year and the whole school is active in the programme, which includes water testing at Old Wairoa Stream; biological sampling (learning about stream life); learning about the freshwater cycle; a litter clean up along the stream; and studies of native fish and stream creatures.
